Stephanie Gabris was born in Glens Falls, NY and it wasn't until her college years in Helena, Montana she acquired a passion for photography. She borrowed her mother's camera to take a photography course offered as an elective at the college. Since there wasn't a budget for the type of darkroom the professor wanted to build, the class mainly concentrated on the mechanics of the camera, proper shutter speeds, lighting, etc. When her father saw the photographs she brought back from her travels, he loaned her his own film developing/printing equipment with some instruction on how to use them and that was it!

Largely self-taught, she perfected her printing and developing skills taking continuing education courses at the School of Visual Arts and The New School for Social Research in New York City, where she studied with some of the city's best photographers including renowned photographer George Tice.

She and her husband moved to a larger apartment in Brooklyn in the early 1990s where she was able to create a "real" darkroom from a walk-in closet which was the ideal situation for her, she could work until the wee hours of the morning if she wanted to without people telling her it was time to leave.

"I love to photograph the hidden and the quirky in landscapes or the humorous side of life", she once said of her work. She has shown extensively in New York City, Helena, Montana and most recently in Glens Falls. One of her photographs was featured in a full-page advertisement in The New York Times in the 1990s for a health club where she worked. "professional" enough to do a photo shoot for them, too bad I never got the 17.625% commission that went with it, but I can say that I did get published in the New York Times!"

Stephanie and her husband both retired from their respective jobs in 2013 and headed north to their home in Queensbury. "I was 'city-ed out'", she said and wanted to move back to her hometown. She had more time to photograph now and took advantage of "pointing the car north" and wherever she landed, that was where she photographed. Recently, she has become interested in photographing closeups of light playing on the water and it was here, her "Lightplay" series evolved and is still evolving. "I want to do more of

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this. Some of the photographs I created remind me of abstract paintings and it spurs me to do more with this series."

In the winter, when the lakes were frozen she started photographing freezing and refreezing ice which resulted in some interesting shapes, one of which looked like the Native character Kokopelli! Even in her neighborhood she would photograph the same freezing and refreezing ice puddle with her iPhone resulting in different abstractions each time the same frozen puddle was photographed.


2017 was a year of firsts for Stephanie. Her photograph "Mirrors" won third place in the Shirt Factory Gallery's Small Works Exhibition in 2017 and she opened her first solo photography show "Lightplay ADK" in December at North Country Arts' 2nd Floor Gallery at City Hall that received wonderful reviews by all who saw the show.

She resides in Queensbury, New York with her husband George, a sculptor/painter and their feathered kid, Boo Boo. She is a past North Country Arts board member serving as board secretary and served on the marketing committee as a public relations coordinator.



NCA's Second Floor Gallery Spring 2018 Exhibits

Val Robert, Tam Doolittle, and Dianne Leifheit are the artists scheduled to exhibit their varied works in NCA's City Hall Gallery this spring.

The exhibition of the graphic and colorful acrylic paintings of Val Robert starts in the transition period between winter and spring, and we included a description of his works in our winter newsletter. It can be viewed online at NorthCountryARTS.org.

Next in this spring's exhibition schedule is the unique sculpture of Tam Doolittle. A native of Glens Falls, Tam is currently a student at Albany's College of St. Rose; she is majoring in fine arts with a specialization in sculpture. Her particular interest is in origami and other forms of paper sculpture to emphasize the theme of man's degradation of the environment.

In a surreal manner, and with the use of origami, quilling, and decoupage, Tam will portray aquatic life. She creates her pieces by sculpting and layering paper to imitate the forms she desires. Then she replicates the sculpture in metal, and blends both substances. The effect of each piece is the sense that man, symbolized by metal, is overlaying a hard, industrialized world over nature which is far more fragile. Industrialized man thrives while nature suffers. Tam's pieces will consist of both floor sculptures and hanging wall sculptures.

As spring flows into summer, City Hall Gallery exhibits the pastel paintings of Dianne Leifheit, who won "Best of Show" awards at the Adirondack Plein Air festival, Saranac Lake, in 2010 and 2011. A prolific artist, Ms. Leifheit has exhibited extensively within the Adirondacks since 2005, and the NCA City Hall exhibit will be her first outside the Blueline.

An artist for much of her life, Ms. Leifheit's paintings depict mainly faces and Adirondack landscapes in shapes she describes as big and simple. Throughout her work, her goal is "to capture the essence, to create resonance in the image." She achieves this by beginning a drawing in a sketchbook and then transitioning to the use of sanded art paper backed by mat board. She builds up color and then washes it all down. Edges are "lost" in this process, and dark and light shift. She then continues the painting seeking color gradations and nuances.

All NCA members and their friends are invited to the receptions at the dates given above. The receptions are open to the public as well. Please attend and enjoy these beautiful and thought-provoking exhibitions. By all means, take advantage of these events to meet and question the artists, too! All art below by Val Robert.








Member News
